Getting to know our Interim Minister

Here is a chance to get to know our Interim Minister, through an interview by a Knox reporter.



Q: Where did you grow up?

A: I was born in Orillia, but our family moved to Winnipeg when I was 5, so I came to love the wide-open prairie sky.

Q: Tell us about your family.

A: I have 3 grown children, living in New Jersey, Waterloo, and Hamilton (a theologian, a professional cellist, and a philosopher). 4 grandchildren, ages 11, 9, 7 and 4 bring me great joy. My mother, age 94, still lives independently and is delighted to able to watch the Knox livestream from out west!

Q: When did you start to play the violin?

A: When I was 10 my school began to offer group lessons. I have always tried to find a group to play with, to motivate me to PRACTISE (I don't relish practising). I play in a trio most Friday mornings (my day

off) with a piano and cello.

Q: We hear you also play a drum.

A: I have a tambourine, and a hand-held frame drum called a tar (no jingles). I haven't practised much recently but I will aim to practice enough so I can play at church once in a while. If my teacher visits some day, you will see what a really good frame-drum player can do.

Q: What is your favorite place in the world?

A: An island in Lake of the Woods (trees, rocks, water) where I spent my summers from age 5-21. My dad directed a children's camp, so I learned to swim, canoe and do canoe trips. Also: a tiny village in S France where I lived for 2 years.

Q: What have you been reading lately?

A: *Fire Weather: the making of a Beast* by John Vaillant, about the Fort McMurray fire, and everything that contributed to that disaster. I could hardly put it down.

Q: What is your more valued possession?

A: It is a hard choice between my collection of pottery and my violin, but I would say my violin because it brings joy to both me and many others, and is portable!

Q: What do you do to relax?

A: I watch British mystery murders; read, garden (I have a certified pollinator-friendly yard!); knit; hang out with my grandkids, cook, hike the Bruce Trail.

CATHY'S CORNER

I hope to include a "Cathy's corner" in each newsletter. This issues' theme is: What is an "Interim" Minister?

Some of you have been asking what the "Interim" means. It is not "a minister who fills in until we can call a regular Minister." That would be Stated Supply.

Interim Ministers are "special" . We are invited into a congregation in times of significant transition, to guide a congregation through it.

Knox is in transition after the retirement of Johan, but there is a larger transition we are undergoing, along with many other congregations in Canada! We are in transition because the world has changed significantly, even in the last 15 years, and that means changes for congregations.

The world has changed in the last 15 years: the invention of the smart phone has sped things up, changes our brains, and distracts us. People can "attend worship" anywhere in the world. Large cultural trends (like secularism, globalism) impact younger generations, so the numbers of non-churched grows.

The world, and the church, has changed because of Covid. Covid broke habits of church attendance, even for people who were long-time and faithful members. Covid led to some switching to livestream, which changes a congregation. Knox has an "online" community of 80-90 people/week!

Knox has changed: The average age of the congregation has increased; that means there is more wisdom, but less energy for the tasks required to keep a congregation working. The small core of people who volunteer is stretched to capacity. Doing livestream every week is great for those who can't attend in person, but it takes a great deal of technical skill to make that happen. That situation is not sustainable in the long term.

All this means that Knox needs to take a hard look at the realities to gain a fresh sense of purpose and identity. Now is the time to pool our wisdom and prayerfully discern together how the Spirit is leading. "Interim Ministry" brings some stability in this in-between time, but more so Interim Ministry is a *different* time, a time perhaps like no other previous time in Knox' lifespan, when we open to how God leads in a new way. I bring no preconceived notion about what direction Knox will choose. That is something we will discover *together* (as in, it will ask all of us to engage in prayer and conversation together). Opening ourselves to change is a spiritual work, done with care, patience, gentleness and courage. Let us pray for courage to receives God's "Behold, I am about to do a new thing!" (Isaiah 43:19). Let us remember that the people of God, throughout history, have walked through many wilderness experiences, through which God provides a way.

Please feel free to talk with me about any questions or concerns you have. I want to hear from you.

A Message for our Interim Moderator

As we come to the end of the church calendar and move into the new year beginning with Advent, we are reminded that the church operates on a different timetable than the world; our calendar is the one that follows the story of God in Jesus Christ. Telling time in the church this way puts us slightly out of rhythm with the broader culture, and while we can't escape the dominant culture's markers - we can subvert them (!) by honouring this ancient rhythm of God's people.

I'm grateful for having Rev. Cathy on board now, and we are working together, along with the Session, to set a process into place by which all the folk at Knox will work together to discern our options for the future. We are currently exploring a process that has been used by other congregations in our denomination and throughout North America called New Beginnings. We are excited about its possibilities and will provide more information in the new year.

I also want to reiterate that conversations with St. Andrew's around amalgamation remain exploratory and will be subject to the New Beginnings process. In other words, it may emerge as one of the ways forward, but it may not. We will need God's guidance and wisdom to discern the options that lie ahead, so, we welcome your patience as we all wait to see what's in store. In the meantime, we believe that partnering with St. Andrew's in some joint events and ministry will always be a good thing, especially where two are better than one.

May you have a blessed Advent and Christmas, and I will see you at the late Christmas Eve service!




Decorating the Church

Just a simple story you will love.

A message sent to my email.

Two Choices,

What would you do? - you make the choice. Don't look for a punchline, there isn't one. Read it anyway. My question is: Would you have made the same choice?

At a fundraising dinner for a school that serves children with learning disabilities, the father of one of the students delivered a speech that would never be forgotten by all who attended. After extolling the school and its dedicated staff, he offered a question:

'When not interfered with by outside influences, everything nature does is done with perfection. Yet my son, Shay, cannot learn things as other children do. He cannot understand things as other children do. Where is the natural order of things in my son?'

The audience was stilled by the query.

The father continued. 'I believe that when a child like Shay, who was mentally and physically disabled comes into the world, an opportunity to realize true human nature presents itself, and it comes in the way other people treat that child.'

Then he told the following story:

Shay and I had walked past a park where some boys Shay knew were playing baseball. Shay asked, 'Do you think they'll let me play?' I knew that most of the boys would not want someone like Shay on their team, but as a father I also understood that if my son were allowed to play, it would give him a much-needed sense of belonging and some confidence to be accepted by others in spite of his handicaps.

I approached one of the boys on the field and asked (not expecting much) if Shay could play. The boy looked around for guidance and said, 'We're losing by six runs and the game is in the eighth inning. I guess he can be on our team and we'll try to put him in to bat in the ninth inning.'

Shay struggled over to the team's bench and, with a broad smile, put on a team shirt. I watched with a small tear in my eye and warmth in my heart. The boys saw my joy at my son being accepted.

In the bottom of the eighth inning, Shay's team scored a few runs but was still behind by three. In the top of the ninth inning, Shay put on a glove and played in the right field. Even though no hits came his way, he was obviously ecstatic just to be in the game and on the field, grinning from ear to ear as I waved to him from the stands. In the bottom of the ninth inning, Shay's team scored again. Now, with two outs and the bases loaded, the potential winning run was on base and Shay was scheduled to be next at bat.

At this juncture, do they let Shay bat and give away their chance to win the game? Surprisingly, Shay was given the bat. Everyone knew that a hit was all but impossible because Shay didn't even know how to hold the bat properly, much less connect with the ball.

However, as Shay stepped up to the plate, the pitcher, recognizing that the other team was putting winning aside for this moment in Shay's life, moved in a few steps to lob the ball in softly so Shay could at least make contact. The first pitch came and Shay swung clumsily and missed. The pitcher again took a few steps forward to toss the ball softly towards Shay. As the pitch came in, Shay swung at the ball and hit a slow ground ball right back to the pitcher.

The game would now be over. The pitcher picked up the soft grounder and could have easily thrown the ball to the first baseman. Shay would have been out and that would have been the end of the game.

Instead, the pitcher threw the ball right over the first baseman's head, out of reach of all teammates.

Everyone from the stands and both teams started yelling, 'Shay, run to first!

Never in his life had Shay ever run that far, but he made it to first base. He scampered down the baseline, wide-eyed and startled.

Everyone yelled, 'Run to second, run to second!'

Catching his breath, Shay awkwardly ran towards second, gleaming and struggling to make it to the base. By time Shay rounded towards second base, the right fielder had the ball. The smallest guy on their team who now had his first chance to be the hero for his team.

He could have thrown the ball to the second baseman for the tag, but he understood the pitcher's intentions so he, too, intentionally threw the ball high and far over the third-baseman's head.

Shay ran toward third base deliriously as the runners ahead of him circled the bases toward home. All were screaming, 'Shay, Shay, Shay, all the Way Shay'

Shay reached third base because the opposing shortstop ran to help him by turning him in the direction of third base, and shouted, 'Run to third!

As Shay rounded third, the boys from both teams, and the spectators, were on their feet screaming, 'Shay, run home! Run home!'

Shay ran to home, stepped on the plate, and was cheered as the hero who hit the grand slam and won the game for his team.

'That day', said the father softly with tears now rolling down his face, 'the boys from both teams helped bring a piece of true love and humanity into this world'.

Shay didn't make it to another summer. He died that winter, having never forgotten being the hero and making me so happy, and coming home and seeing his Mother tearfully embrace her little hero of the day!

A wise man once said every society is judged by how it treats its least fortunate amongst them.

May your day be a Shay Day.
